Our day-to-day lives are shaped by the use of watches and clocks. However, these devices that tell us when class starts or work has finished are human inventions. At the same time, humans are also dependent on another type of timekeeping mechanism that is embedded in our genes and existed before our ability to invent and use machines. Our biological clock, also called a “circadian clock,” helps to guide our sleep, ensure our alertness, and even maintain our health. The word “circadian” is derived from the Latin words *circa* and *dies* meaning “about” and “day,” respectively, and refers to a naturally-occurring 24-hour cycle.

A day is a cycle of light and dark that lasts 24 hours; these changes in light inform our circadian clock, which roughly follows the same 24-hour pattern. Our bodies adjust to day and night by subconsciously preparing us for the next phase. For example, as the planet spins and the dark of night arrives, our circadian clock gradually lowers our body temperature and blood pressure, making us feel tired in preparation for sleep. Just before we wake up in the morning, our natural clock gives our metabolism a boost, getting us ready for the day's activities.

During the 24-hour day, we are repairing cells and breaking down our food into useful compounds such as proteins, fats, and carbohydrates. [1], our bodies continually produce the energy we need in order to walk, exercise, or work. Thousands of biological functions must work in harmony for all of these processes to take place successfully. Without a biological clock ensuring that each of our cells is getting the material it needs at the right time and place, our biological demands would be impossible to fulfill.

The notion of a body clock was first explored in the fourth century, but it was not until the work of Jeffrey Hall, Michael Rosbash, and Michael Young in the 1980s that we gained our first clear understanding of how this innate time-keeping works. They discovered that the information that guides our circadian clock is embedded in our genes. The team was awarded the 2017 Nobel Prize in Physiology or Medicine for their isolation of biological clock genes in fruit flies.

Genes almost identical to those in fruit flies can be found in humans, birds, and even fish. An appreciation of how circadian clocks function and the role they play in human biology has led to advances in many areas. Perhaps the most important of these is an understanding of how circadian rhythms are linked to overall health. The disruption of a biological clock can have seriously adverse effects on our well-being.

Shift workers are particularly prone to circadian disturbance. Night-shift workers who try to sleep during the day tend to have shorter and poorer-quality sleep. This is because the circadian system is instructing their bodies that they should be awake. Such interference can have a negative impact on memory, problem-solving abilities, and emotions. Research has shown that night-shift work can increase the risk of physical illnesses such as heart disease, diabetes, and obesity, mental illnesses such as depression, and neurological conditions like Alzheimer's disease.

Future research into biological clocks is essential. Chronobiology is a new field of investigation that combines our current understanding of the biological clock with exploration in the field of medicine. By engaging in such investigation, scientists hope to further understand why circadian disruption has such a significant impact on our health and gain more knowledge on how it can be treated.

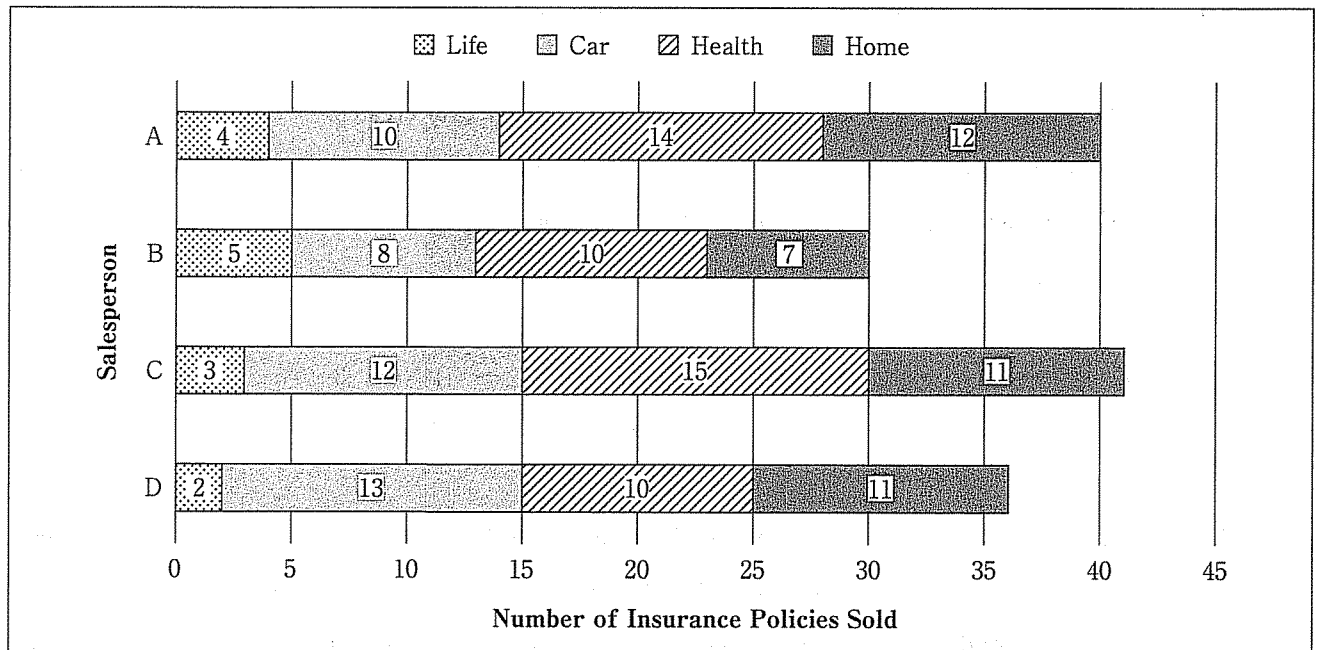

The above graph shows sales of life, car, health, and home insurance policies by four different salespeople at Argan Insurance Company for the month of March, 2018.
